Tevet 1 - Shevat 2, 5785







The Jewish story in modern history has been framed as one of a tragic leaving at the hands of intolerance or oppression, and return through struggle and hope. We need to think only of the modern Zionist movement, our Rabbinic holiday of Hanukah, meaning "rededication," to see this theme borne out. But, the roots of our living tradition, as we see them in our Torah teaches us the importance of "leaving," ווצא for spiritual transformation. True transformation means attaining for yourself the discipline of leaving behind the familiar, and sometimes totally. True leaving is undaunted courage, and Gd asks this of every one of us human beings.

The texture of the world of dreams is wholly unlike the physical, orderly, and well-understood structure of the waking world. Heaven speaks to us in dreams in the ancient world, and in the modern world, we frame this as a dialogue between the conscious mind and the unconscious mind, or the repair and restructuring of the brain.

We read in the the Torah not only that Jacob sets out "ויצא" but also that he leaves the waking world to the strange universe of the dream: "Jacob left Beer-sheba, and set out for Haran. He came upon a certain place and stopped there for the night, for the sun had set. Taking one of the stones of that place, he put it under his head and lay down in that place. He had a dream; a stairway was set on the ground and its top reached to the sky, and messengers of God were going up and down on it. And standing beside him was יהוה, the God of your father Abraham's [house] and the God of Isaac's [house]: the ground on which you are lying I will assign to you and to your offspring (Genesis 28:10, ff.)."

What I want to draw your attention to is the notion of an anchor between the world of the living and conscious and the strange world of dreams—so strange is it that it materializes for Jacob as one in which Gd Gdself appears with a body (!)—notice the stone. Jacob consciously takes a stone to place under his head. Jacob does this to have a point of contact between the old and the new.

One of the things that happens to people when they set about to transform themselves is that they go forth, as our tradition advises, to somewhere new, toward an aspiration or a hope. As the kids from Hebrew School can tell you from our learning this week, at the center of the Hebrew word for hope, תקוה, is the word for a "straight line" that you draw from where you want to be where to need to go as you go forth, and that word is ווועד. But in placing the stone between his dream and his waking life, Jacob maintains a point of connection between the very spot and substance where he lays his head to rest and the location and material where he opened his eyes in the world of the dream. He did not draw a line, but rather chose a point of integrity that was unchanged between the beginning and the end of his journey.

And that is the message with which I want to leave you tonight. To succeed in self-transformation, in going forth from not only where but also from who and what you are, you must lay that stone for yourself. You can't obliterate the self, abnegate the way Gd made you as a unique individual in the world. You carry with you those best and most unique parts of yourself.

Just as the stone of the waking world was the stone of the dreaming world, so too was Jacob himself the same set of attributes, weaknesses, and strengths in the dream world where he met Gd and was transformed as he was in his waking, physical self. So too must you be when you set out to change and grow, as we all must. Do not draw a line and cast yourself away; hold on to the stone of your integrity and go forth to the new, with the truth that who and what you are was already enough and beautiful.
